- Aim to arrive at S5 (Sixth Form Hall) soon after 3.30pm usually there will be tea, coffee and biscuits the session will begin at about 3.40pm and finish by 5pm at the latest but watch out for occasional exceptions.

We hope that you will find something of interest in these masterclasses - and that you enjoy them as much as we enjoy preparing and delivering them.



'One Belt, One Road' - China's New Silk Roads with Guo Chentao


China's 'One Belt, One Road' initiative has been called a Chinese Marshall Plan, a state-backed campaign for global dominance, a stimulus package for a slowing economy, and a massive marketing campaign for something that was already happening – Chinese investment around the world. One thing's for sure, the world has never seen a project of such ambition and and cost, which is likely to rise to around \$1 trillion: 40 times more than the US Apollo space programme. What is going on? Find out from Mr. Guo Chentao, Director of Policy at the Chinese Embassy in London.

I AM DYNAMITE! AN INTRODUCTION TO FRIEDRICH NIETZSCHE WITH SUE PRIDEAUX

The writer and biographer Sue Prideaux has made a name for herself in recent years for choosing to write about 'problematic' but highly compelling creative men; first Edvard Munch and August Strindberg - and now the German philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche. Famous (or infamous) for his assertion that God is dead and for his advocacy of the 'Will to power' and the 'Übermensch' (Superman) - Nietzsche is perhaps one of the most misunderstood, but also one of the most important, philosophers of all time. Come to this masterclass to find out why.

An Introduction to the History, Philosophy and Politics of Science – with Emma Tobin


In this masterclass Dr Emma Tobin (associate professor at UCL's Department of Science and Technology Studies) will introduce the study of the History and Philosophy of Science - exploring the relationship between science, technology and medicine and wider society and politics. Is the clash between science and religion inevitable? Is science 'progressive', or are science and ethics in opposition? How have politicians used science and technology in the past (particularly in wartime), and how should it be used in the future? How and why should science be communicated to the non-expert general public? Come along to discuss these, and other important questions.

To Hell and Back – An Introduction to Dante's Divine Comedy WITH JON STUBBINGS

Dante's extraordinary visionary journey through the Inferno, Purgatorio and Paradiso represents the culmination of the Medieval European worldview - and his sublime poetry has inspired other artists, composers and poets for almost a thousand years. It is not essential to understand the contemporary politics and religious beliefs of Dante's day in order to read and enjoy *The Divine Comedy* today – but a little bit of background might help to provide a way in. This masterclass will attempt to set out some basic aspects of context and give a taste of Dante's poetry in English translation.


HEALTHY OCEANS, HEALTHY PLANET AN INTRODUCTION TO MARINE CONSERVATION WITH FERN GOLDSMITH

In this masterclass Fern Goldsmith will tackle the big questions regarding the world's oceans and the environment: Why should we be care about the state of our oceans? To what extent is plastic pollution the biggest threat? What are marine protected areas and are they the answer to saving the oceans? How can you get involved in marine conservation?

Murder in Kafranbel – A Story of the Syrian War with Kellie Strøm


In this masterclass Kellie Strøm will give an introduction to Syria's tragic civil war through the story of Raed Fares and Hammoud al-Juneid, two non-violent activists gunned down last November in their home town of Kafranbel, Idlib. Kellie is a volunteer activist with Syria Solidarity UK and edits Syria Notes - a small journal aimed MPs that seeks to build a greater understanding in Parliament of the current conflict in Syria and the diplomatic, humanitarian and military options for UK policy.




The Left Book Club Then and Now With Brekhna Aftab

The Left Book Club was founded by Victor Gollancz in 1936 - offering a monthly book choice, for sale to members only. Membership peaked at 57,000, with notable authors such as George Orwell contributing titles before it ceased publishing in 1948. In 2015 the Left Book Club was relaunched as a non-profit organisation (with the full approval of Saint Jeremy of Islington North, it goes without saying). In this talk Brekhna Aftab will tell us about both the origins of the LBC in its first incarnation and about its ongoing mission today.

Map of the Invisible -A Journey into Particle Physics with Jon Butterworth

In this talk Jon Butterworth will explore our current state of knowledge of particle physics, the so-called standard model, which was completed by the discovery of the Higgs boson in 2012. This gives us a map of the invisible world of subatomic physics. But what does the map reveal, what lies beyond its limits and what are the latest experiments telling us? Jon is a physics professor at University College London who also works on the Atlas experiment at CERN's Large Hadron Collider.
