

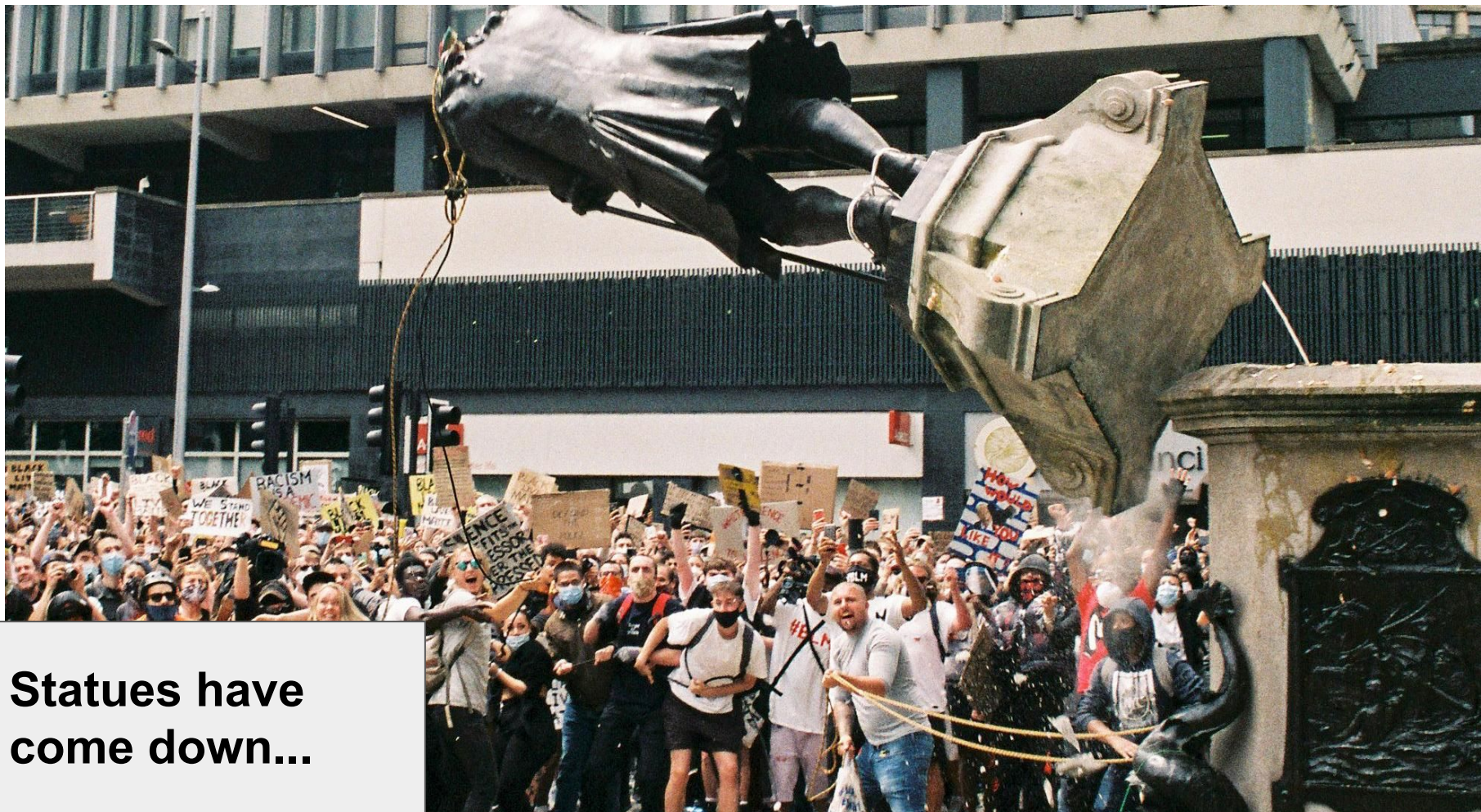

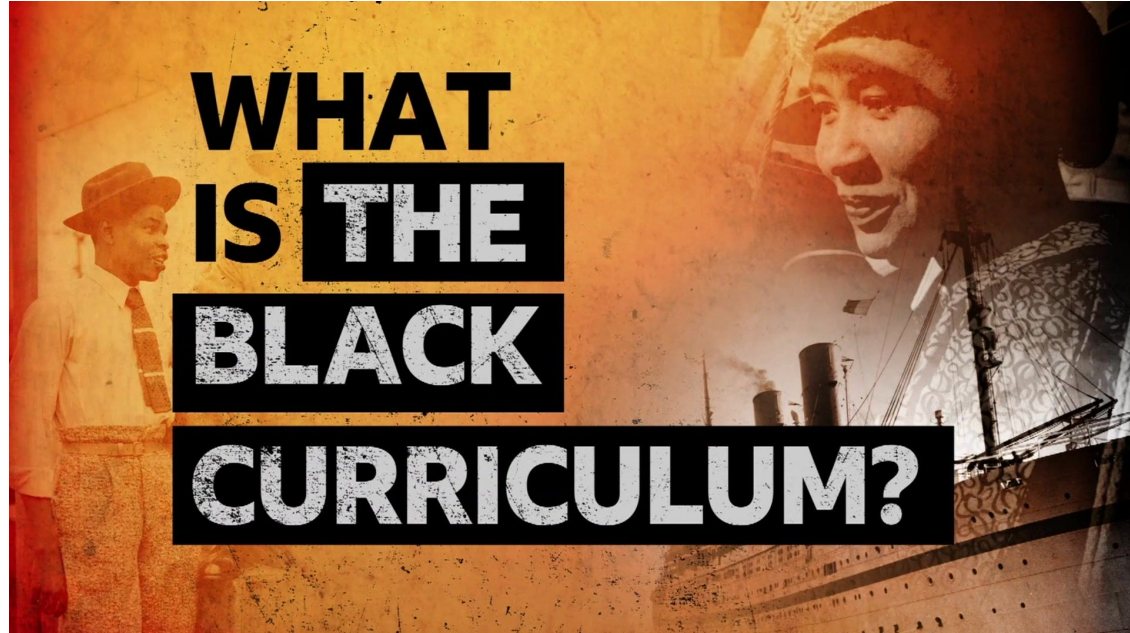
2020 saw issues of racism come to the fore with Black Lives Matter protests in the USA and the UK...





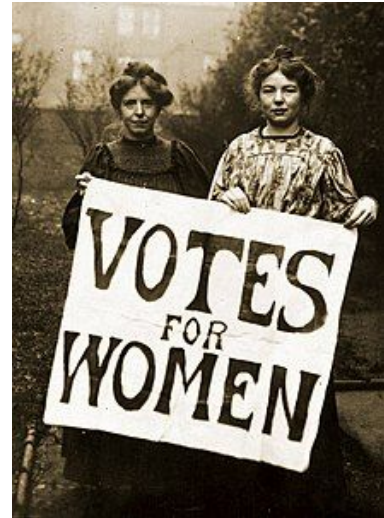
**Statues have

Our ethos is;

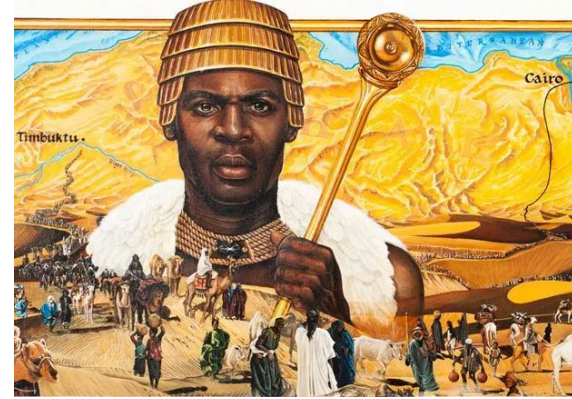
“The CSG History department aims to help students become **curious, compassionate and critical citizens** through the study of the past”

What we have done...

Year 7

- Created a series of lessons on Mansa Musa for Year 7.
- Mansa Musa was an African king from the 1300s who is the richest person ever!



What we have done...

Year 8

- Developed a series of lessons on European exploration and colonisation of the 'new world'
- Continued to develop our teaching of the transatlantic slave trade and the British Empire



What we have done...

Year 9

- Developed a brand new series of lessons on immigration to the UK from 1000-present
- Focus on the reasons for, impact of and reaction to immigration over 1000 years.
